How to Write a Newspaper Article



Newspapers and news websites deliver news, information, and stories from around the world.

Understanding the structure of a news article is essential for budding writers and journalists. In this activity, we will break down the key structural features of a newspaper article.



The Inverted Pyramid

Imagine a pyramid turned upside down, with the broad base at the top and the narrow point at the bottom. This shape represents how a news article should be structured. The inverted pyramid starts with the most critical information at the beginning and gradually includes less crucial details as it progresses. This approach ensures that readers grasp the essential points even if they only read the first few sentences.

<u>The Headline</u>

The headline is the newspaper's first point of contact with the reader. It serves to grab the reader's attention while summarising the main point of the article.

The Lead

The lead is arguably the most important part of a news article. It consists of the first two or three sentences that should convey the article's main message. Key features of an effective lead paragraph include:

Conciseness: Use as few words as possible to convey the message.

Clarity: Explain clearly what has happened.

The Four Ws

To ensure that readers understand the essential details of the article, include the Four Ws in your first three or four sentences

Who: Identify the people mainly affected by the events.

What: Explain the key events.

Where: Specify the location of the events.

When: Provide the time, day, and, if necessary, the year of the events.

The Body

The body is the heart of the newspaper article, where you delve into more detail about the events. It typically consists of 10 to 12 sentences. Key features of the body include:

Give information about the How and Why: Explain how the events occurred and then explore why they happened.

Detailed Information: Provide a comprehensive account of what happened.

Background Information: Include relevant background information.

Evidence and Quotes: Incorporate facts, evidence, and quotes from relevant individuals.

Grammar

News articles are always written using third-person language.

Good news articles avoid using personal opinions about the topic.

Past Tense: Use the past tense in all news articles.

Air New Zealand has secured the title of the safest airline in the world for the year 2023, recapturing the position from Australia's Qantas airline. The award was announced by Airline Ratings, a website dedicated to providing travelers with valuable information.

This recognition was based on Air New Zealand's extensive safety record and current systems. Airline Ratings considered factors like the rarity of serious incidents, the gravity of recent accidents, the airline's safety oversight and compliance, its financial performance, safety measures, and the age of its aircraft fleet.

Not included in the assessment were factors beyond the airline's control, such as bird strikes, turbulenceinduced passenger injuries, flight route adjustments due to adverse weather conditions, and lightning strikes on aircraft.

Geoffrey Thomas, the website's editor, praised Air New Zealand's unwavering commitment to passenger safety and lauded its exceptional performance in ensuring passenger security, particularly in the face of challenging weather conditions at airports like Wellington and Queenstown.

The website revealed that among the top 25 safest airlines worldwide, variances in safety records were minimal, underscoring the industry-wide commitment to upholding safety standards and ensuring a secure flying experience for all passengers.

Captain David Morgan, responsible for Air New Zealand's safety protocols, expressed elation at the airline's designation as the safest. He said that their "primary focus remains on the safety and well-being of passengers".

This latest recognition adds to Air New Zealand's already impressive track record. Previously, the same website declared Air New Zealand as the world's best airline.



FEATURE ARTICLE - Deforestation



Picture this: You are walking through a green forest, surrounded by trees which tower above up into the canopy. Leaves are crunching under your feet, piwakawaka are singing their song, and there is not a cloud in sight. Now imagine all of that gone: empty fields with an array of tree stumps poking out is all that you can see, animals vanished, and the air does not feel so clean now.

This is what is happening in our world right now. It's called deforestation, and it's one of the biggest challenges our planet is facing. In this article, we are going to be continuing our topic of 'The big issues' and seeing what Deforestation is, why it's a problem, and what we can do to help.

Firstly, what is deforestation? Deforestation the purposeful cutting down, burning, or clearing of forested land. People cut down forests to make space for farms and buildings, for certain foods such as palm oil, and for timber.

Every minute forests the size of several football fields are being cut down. That's not just bad news for the trees—it's bad news for all of us. Forests aren't just homes for animals or places to visit. They're like the Earth's lungs, helping us breathe and storing carbon dioxide.

You might be wondering, why is deforestation such a big deal? Deforestation affects the climate, animals, people, and it even impacts global issues. Firstly, there's the climate. Trees absorb carbon dioxide and release oxygen, making the air clean and breathable. Then there are the animals. Forests are home to millions of species, and when forests disappear, these creatures lose their homes and often can't survive elsewhere.

Deforestation doesn't just hurt animals—it also affects people. There are groups of people who have lived in forests for generations, relying on them for food, water, and medicine. When their forests are destroyed, their way of life is threatened. And finally, the global impact. Deforestation contributes to soil erosion, where rich, fertile land becomes useless for farming. It also makes flooding worse because trees help soak up rainwater.

To put a stop to deforestation, there are a few things that we can change in our everyday life. We can help by using less paper and wood, recycling, and choosing products made from sustainable materials. Supporting companies that protect forests or use eco-friendly practices also makes a difference. Planting trees is a great way to replace what's been lost, and donating to or volunteering with organisations that fight deforestation can help your impact.

Deforestation is a big problem, but we can all help solve it. By recycling, planting trees, and choosing sustainable products, we can protect forests and the animals and people who depend on them. Every small action adds up, and together, we can make a difference for our planet's future.
